

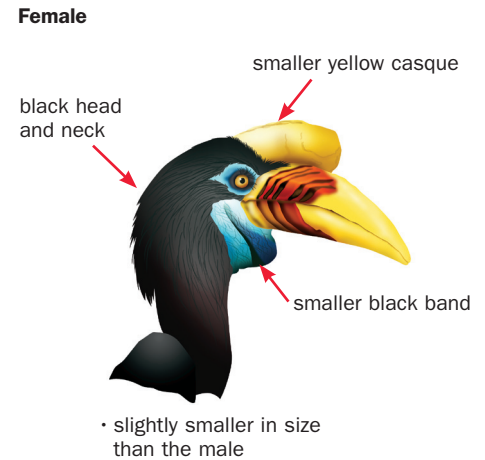
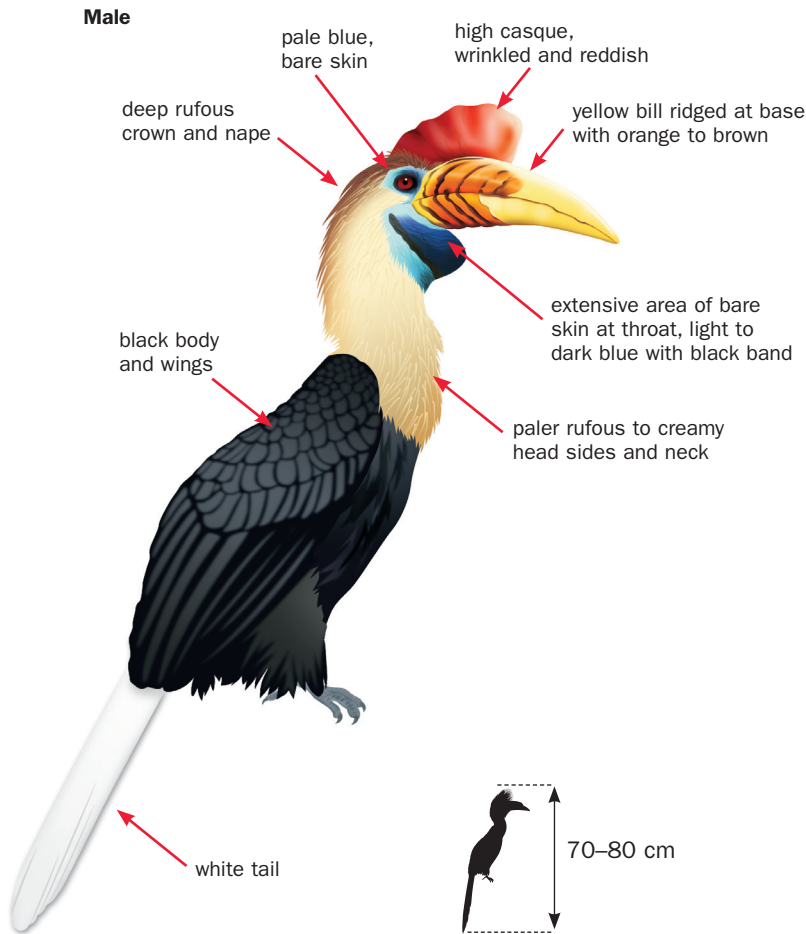


Aceros cassidix

Scientific Name: *Aceros cassidix*
Subspecies: None known
Synonyms: *Buceros cassidix*,
Rhyticeros cassidix

Common Names: (E) Buton Hornbill, Celebes Hornbill, Greater Sulawesi Hornbill, Knobbed Hornbill, Red-knobbed Hornbill, Sulawesi Hornbill, Sulawesi Wrinkled Hornbill
(F) Calao à cimier
(S) Cálao de Sulawesi, Cálao grande de Célebes

CITES: Appendix II since June 11, 1992



Juvenile:
• similar to male
• lacks casque
• bill plain yellow

NOTE: *Aceros cassidix* is listed by IUCN (International Union for Conservation of Nature) as Least Concern. This species is likely to be declining owing to habitat loss. Your help is therefore necessary to control the trade in this species.

Glossary

Casque: a piece of defensive or ornamental armour for the head

Countries Targeted

Countries of Origin: Indonesia

Countries of Import: Germany, Japan, Netherlands, Singapore, Spain, Switzerland

Countries of Export: Philippines, United States of America

Parts and Derivatives

Skull and tail feathers are used to make traditional costumes for ceremonies. The casque is used for ornamental carvings and the bill to make jewelry. Please be vigilant when encountering such items.

Inspection Considerations

While proceeding with the physical inspection of live bird shipments, pay special attention to the country of origin of the birds as described on permits and invoices. Specimens might be concealed in shipments of non-CITES species.

As this species is listed under Appendix II, the shipment must be accompanied by a CITES export/re-export permit issued by the exporting/re-exporting country.
